Summary The Eleanor Merritt Collection holds printed materials, lectures,

records, news clippings, audio-visual materials, and

correspondence related to Eleanor Merritt's life-long career as an artist, teacher, and advocate for community arts organizations. Materials focus on Merritt's life in Long Island, New York and Sarasota, Florida. Her formative years are captured in essays while a college student, planning notebooks as an art history teacher, and

printed materials documenting her early artistic career.

Her involvement with the arts community primarily pertains to her work with the Women's Caucus of Art (WCA), Women of Color (WOCA), the Petticoat Painters, Community Art in Public Places (CAPP), Florida Artists Group, Pierian Spring Academy, and as a docent and board member of The John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art. There are a significant number of art history lecture outlines and source materials on African American, Feminist, and minority artists.

Biographical Note

Artist Eleanor Merritt was born in Harlem, New York on August 17, 1933, and is a first generation Jamaican-American. Her father, Wilbert Lipsett Sr. was a leather goods artist,

cobbler, member of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, United Negro Improvement Association, and African Communities League (UNIA-ACL). Merritt's mother, Lynette Hyman-Lipsett, was the daughter of a jewelry maker of Syrian-Jewish descent and an Afro-Portuguese mother. Both Merritt's parents lived in Harlem, NY during the Harlem Renaissance.

Merritt attended the prestigious High School for Music and Art in New York and then attended Brooklyn College where she received her B.A. in Art in 1955 and her M.A. in Fine Arts and Education in 1958. While at Brooklyn College, Merritt studied alongside the noted Abstract Expressionists Mark Rothko, Ad Rhinehart, Kurt Seligmann, Burgoyne Diller, and Jimmy Ernst.

While attending Brooklyn College, Eleanor married Lorenzo Merritt and they had two daughters: Lori, in 1958, and Lisa, in 1960. The family traveled often: attending the World's Fair in Seattle in 1962, taking a road trip from New York to Acapulco, Mexico in 1965, traveling across Europe in 1967 to Spain and North Africa, visiting Ghana in 1970, and making multiple trips to Jamaica and the Caribbean.

Merritt worked on her doctorate in Arts Education at Hofstra University. She became the first African American art teacher for the Nassau County New York School District and the first African American to serve as Chair of their Art Department, a position she held for twenty-seven years. She was an original member of the Long Island Black Artist Association (LIBAA).

Merritt was an advocate within local and national art organizations when she came to Sarasota. Here she focused on creating more equitable opportunities for women artists of color. She was the program manager for the Women's Caucus for Arts' Women of Color (WOCA) Slide Project, The Ringling's first African American female board member, a long-standing member of the Florida Artists Group, a Petticoat Painter, and founded the Women Contemporary Artists group.

Merritt worked within the local community as chairman of the Sarasota Art in Public Places Committee, was a board member of the Arts & Cultural Alliance of Sarasota County, Arts Council and Art Center, Sarasota, and a board member and former President of the Venice Art Center. She served as a docent for 25 years at The Ringing and was involved with the National Museum of Women in the Arts.

Eleanor Merritt was married to Lorenzo Merritt from 1954 -1976, and to Chris Darlington from 1980 to his passing in 2017. Eleanor Merritt died January 16th, 2019.

Merritt exhibited at the University of Florida, the University of Connecticut, American International College, the Carnegie Endowment Institute in NYC, the Contemporary Art Museum in Jacksonville, Florida, the Polk Museum in Lakeland, the Houston Museum of African American Culture, and the Florida Museum of Art and in galleries in California, Colorado, the U.K., and Shimonoseki, Japan. She had 25 one woman shows.

In 2022 the Estate of Eleanor Merritt donated three works by Merritt to The John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art: *Here Comes the Sun, Afua's Father,* and *Remembrance*. This same year, The Ringling established the Eleanor Merritt Fellowship, a one-year paid position designed

to support underrepresented graduate students who have an interest in arts and museum professions.

Scope and Content Note

The Eleanor Merritt collection holds printed materials, lectures, records, news clippings, audio visual materials, and correspondence which capture Eleanor Merritt's life-long career as an artist, teacher, and leader of community arts organizations. This collection documents how Merritt organized and recorded her substantial involvement with the Sarasota County arts community and the growth of her career as an artist and teacher overtime. The collection reflects Merritt's life-long advocacy for women and women of color in the arts. This interest is apparent in the types of organizations she was involved with, the themes of her artwork, and teaching materials, all highlighting the history of minority artists.

The collection is arranged by subject in chronological order spanning from 1950 – 2019, with the majority of the collection dating after 2000. Material from prior to 1980 pertains to Merritt's life in New York. Notable in these files are illustrated high school reports of art from the Metropolitan Museum of Art, an art lesson planning book she illustrated while at Westbury High School, and her numerous essays on pedagogical theory while at Hofstra University.

Merritt documented her career, involvement with community art organizations, and her art within the binders in this collection. The binders hold numerous photographs of her artworks, exhibition pamphlets, and related newspaper and magazine clippings, with many arranged in a scrap-book style. Especially present within these files are printed materials relating to the Women Contemporary Artists (WCA). From Merritt's late career teaching art history, there are a large number of lecture outlines and reference materials on minority artists.
